



We Donate Redeemables

The RVHS Life Skills Program takes all aluminum cans and glass/plastic bottles marked with a deposit value. If they still have their labels, place them in the corresponding barrels.

Cardboard

- ✓ Corrugated cardboard only. Clean, dry and flattened. Leave loose; don't tie.
- ✗ Dirty, greasy, painted, waxed or otherwise contaminated cardboard.

Mixed Paper

- ✓ **Paper:** Computer, copy, fax, writing, ledger. Wrapping paper, junk mail, magazines, catalogs, phone books, gray board, newsprint, paperbacks, hardbacks with covers removed. **Thin cardboard:** Food boxes, shoe boxes, tissue boxes, paper egg cartons, soda and beer packaging. **Brown paper bags:** Recycle with mixed paper or leave in the nearby collection area.
- ✗ Wax- or plastic-coated paper. Examples are paper milk cartons and coated shopping bags. Paper towels, tissues, napkins. Foil gift wrap. Carbon paper. Non-tearable envelopes.

Reduce. Reuse. Recycle.

Glass

- ✓ Glass bottles and jars. Clean and rinsed, with the lids removed.
- ✗ Light bulbs of any kind, flower vases, drinking glasses, window glass, tempered glass, ovenware, dishes, ceramics. Any broken non-recyclable glass should be boxed or bagged and thrown away with your regular trash.

Plastic

- ✓ Recyclable plastic must be in the correct form, with the correct resin number.
Form: Bottles, jars, jugs, tubs and lids.
Resin number: #1 (PET), #2 (HDPE), #3 (PVC), #4 (LDPE), #5 (PP) or #7 (OTHER).
- ✗ Plastic bags of any kind. Black plastic. Plastic films and cling wraps. 6-pack rings (please cut rings before throwing away). Plastic planting pots. Potato chip bags. Clamshell plastic, including salad and berry packaging. Styrofoam and all other polystyrene (#6) products. PVC (#3) not in the correct form. Plastic toys, utensils, hoses, buckets, medicine vials, siding, clothing, paint cans and other plastic items that do not have a recycling code. Transfer Station staff will clarify appropriate disposal options.

Plastic Chemical Containers

- ✓ We can recycle many, as long as they are empty and stamped with one of the recycling codes above. Examples are containers for household chemicals and automotive oil.
- ✗ Containers from other automotive fluids, herbicides, pesticides or fossil fuels.



Clothing

- ✓ Clean, usable clothing and shoes may be deposited in the collection shed at the gate.

Metal

- ✓ **Redeemable aluminum cans:** Place in the corresponding bin for donation.
- Metal food or drink containers:** These go into the “commingled” roll-off container with recyclable plastic. Remove the metal lids and add those as well.
- Scrap metal:** Any other metal not mentioned above. That includes bottle caps, clean aluminum foil/pie plates, pots, pans, clothes hangers and appliances. Metal paint cans must be empty of any residue, and dry, with the lids off. Ask the Transfer Station staff about any metal items that could be set aside for someone else to reuse.

E-Waste

- ✓ The Transfer Station accepts electronic waste, including many items that run off household current or batteries.
- ✗ Batteries. Light bulbs of any kind.

Yard Waste and Food Scraps

- ✓ Organic kitchen waste. Grass clippings and leaves. Brush less than 6” in diameter. See Fee Schedule for brush larger than 6”.
- ✗ Lumber, sawdust from lumber, wood furniture, wood construction debris.

Other Places to Recycle

- ✓ **Light Bulbs:** Lowe’s and Home Depot take unbroken CFL bulbs.
- ✓ **Batteries:** Some retailers such as Lowe’s and Home Depot have drop-off locations.
- ✓ **Plastic Planting Pots:** Lowe’s takes them. Some nurseries do as well, but call first to confirm. Home Depot does not accept them.
- ✓ **Plastic Bags:** Some retailers have drop-off bins, including Rite Aid in Stone Ridge. Collection bins are useful for people who need extra bags for household use.



Once you purchase a valid permit, there is no charge to recycle any of the approved items in this brochure. For household garbage, Marbletown charges on a Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT) basis.
