Introduction

The proposed action consists of the adoption of Town Comprehensive Plan amendments to the Town's 2005 Town Plan. The Marbletown Town Board conducted a periodic review of the 2005 Plan as recommended in the Plan, and determined it was in need of updating. This process began in 2022.

In 2022, the Town Board adopted a Community Preservation Plan and established a Community Preservation Fund to protect Marbletown's community character, following voter approval of a referendum in accordance with the Hudson Valley Community Preservation Act. In 2022, the Town Board also appointed a Housing Committee to conduct research on the issue of housing affordability and to make recommendations to the Town Board. In March of 2023, the Housing Committee presented a number of recommendations for actions by the Town. The Town Board joined the Ulster County Housing Smart Communities program and began exploring the options available to address housing affordability in Marbletown.

During the Town Board's review of the 2005 Plan, the Town Board hired a professional planning consultant and determined that the 2005 Town Plan was still relevant but was in need of modifications to address and update the continuing need for protection of natural and cultural resources and to consider new ways of providing for housing that is both affordable and needed by local emergency services providers, farm laborers, teachers, Town employees, young families, senior citizens and others on limited incomes. The amendments proposed to the 2005 Town Plan, through a 2024 Update, primarily address the above two issues. Other changes proposed to the 2005 Town Plan include:

 Updated population and housing data from the 2020 US Census and other sources with important new data on the significant rise in housing costs since the 2005 Town Plan was adopted; this included a 2022 public opinion survey by the Town

Housing Committee which found that 80% of the respondents indicated there was: "Not enough adequate, affordable housing in Marbletown."

- Updating the Plan's Vision Statement with a new statement re-committing to the 2005 vision while recognizing a continuing need to balance Marbletown's smalltown rural character with protection of the town's natural resources and the pressing need for affordable housing
- Committing to a review of housing and environmental initiatives sponsored by New York State and Ulster County
- Revisiting the Town's existing Zoning law rules for affordable housing to determine
 if adjustments should be considered to increase the supply of such housing
- Focusing on the hamlets of Stone Ridge and High Falls to provide affordable living opportunities
- Reducing transportation costs for residents by continuing to support pedestrian and bicycle connections in the Town
- Updating the Town's accomplishment in planning and zoning since 2005 including those addressing historic resources, natural resources, biodiversity, groundwater resources including drinking water sources, and resident priorities for preserving the Town's community character
- Updating the measures taken for the 2024 Update to comply with Section 272-a of New York State Town Law regarding public engagement, review and adoption of comprehensive plans and comprehensive plan amendments
- Reinforcing the 2005 Town Plan's policy to create: "Housing opportunities for the full economic range the Town's population should be provided in a form that is compatible with the scale and pattern of existing development."
- Reinforcing the 2005 Town Plan's policy to designate the hamlets of Stone Ridge and High Falls as the ideal locations for:
 - a. Enhancing affordable living for town residents because of the historic development patterns in place in those locations

- Availability of existing and planned infrastructure in the two hamlets to serve more compact living
- c. The potential for providing for new sidewalks and trails to serve pedestrians and bicyclists in areas that already are served by non-motorized transportation
- d. Continuing the scale and patterns of historic development established in the 1600's in Marbletown
- Strengthening the Town's conservation development and related rules to ensure
 that new development, in areas designated for low density residential, agriculture,
 and other open space uses, is designed and approved in a manner that is consistent
 with environmentally sound planning standards and guidelines

The above updates to the 2005 Town Plan are not expected to cause significant adverse impacts on the environment. This Part 3 EAF examines the potential environmental effects of the present action on Historic and Archaeological Resources identified in the Part 2 EAF question 10, the only impact category that was checked YES on the Part 2 EAF that involves environmental resources where a narrative environmental assessment is required and provided as follows:

Potential Environmental Impacts Discussion

This Part 3 EAF serves as an assessment of the potential for adverse environmental impacts on historic and archaeological resources and as documentation of the proposed 2024 Town Plan Update amendments. No attempt has been made, nor is it required at this time, to address actual impacts of construction activity related to any changes or updates to the proposed to the 2005 Town Plan. All applications for development approvals in the Town of Marbletown are subject to SEQR and both the Town Planning Board and Town Zoning Board of Appeals, as the two principal land use approval agencies in the Town, are generally responsible for ensuring that SEQR is adhered to when applications are filed.

10. Impact on Historic and Archeological Resources

 The proposed action may occur wholly or partially within, or substantially contiguous to, any buildings, archaeological site or district which is listed on the National or State Register of Historical Places, or that has been determined by the Commissioner of the NYS Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation to be eligible for listing on the State Register of Historic Places.

Marbletown is the home of Stone Ridge's Main Street Historic District, the High Falls Historic District, and buildings, structures, and sites individually listed on the New York State Register of Historic Places and the National Register of Historic Places. Marbletown's place in the history of the nation, the state, and the county has been recognized by the register's designations. Marbletown already has an established policy (see 2005 Plan) that seeks to use: "All practicable means to protect these resources should be taken and these should likewise be addressed in development planning." The 2024 Plan Update reinforces this policy by the following proposed amendment: "All practicable means to protect these resources, such as use of the Community Preservation Fund, should be taken and these should likewise be addressed in development planning."

- b. The Town of Marbletown contains areas with the potential for yielding sensitive archaeological resources due to its history dating back to European settlements from the 1600's and Native American settlements dating back thousands of years. No construction activity is proposed nor is any authorized by the adoption of the 2024 Town Plan Update. No adverse impacts are expected as a result of the proposed action.
- c. The proposed action may occur wholly or partially within, or substantially contiguous to, an area designated as sensitive for archaeological sites on the NY State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) archaeological site inventory.

Future land disturbance activities in the Town in areas of archaeological sensitivity can be expected to be subject to archaeological assessments prior to approvals by the Town, County, or State as part of the protections in place by the State Environmental Quality Review Act and other laws. No adverse impacts are expected as a result of the proposed action.
