### **CALL TO ORDER**

### **GEOTHERMAL STUDY:**

Tom Konrad, ECC Chairman, discussed funding for a possible scoping study. Konrad wrote a letter of interest and forwarded to the Town Board for their review. He explained that there was approximately 13 million dollars in grants to be awarded. The deadline for the grant application is October 1<sup>st</sup>. # RESOLUTION#72-2022; LOCAL LAW # 7, ADOPTING AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW YORK STATE PUBLIC OFFICER'S LAW §103, EXPANDING THE USE OF VIDEOCONFRENCING AT PUBLIC MEETINGS

The following Resolution was offered by Councilwoman Foote and seconded by Councilman Davenport **WHEREAS** on April 9, 2022, Governor Hochul signed Legislation into law which amended New York State's Public Officers Law ("Public Officers Law") to expand the permitted use of video conferencing at public meetings. (See Chapter 56 of the Laws of 2022 and Public Officer's Law §103, as amended.), and **WHEREAS**, a resolution was duly adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown on June 21, 2022, setting a public hearing to be held by said Town Board on July 19, 2022, at 6:00 p.m. at the Rondout Municipal Center, 1925 Lucas Ave. Cottekill NY 12419; and

**WHEREAS**, said public hearing was duly held on July 19, 2022, at the Rondout Municipal Center, 1925 Lucas Ave. Cottekill NY 12419, at said time, and all parties were permitted an opportunity to comment on behalf of or in opposition to said proposed Local Law, or any part thereof as set forth in the Notice of Public Hearing; and **NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown (by the favorable vote of not less than a majority of all the members of the Board) as follows:

That the Town Board hereby adopts Local Law No. 7 of 2022, now referred to as Local Law No. 7 of 2022, entitled "A LOCAL LAW ADOPTING AMENDMENTS TO THE NEW YORK STATE PUBLIC OFFICER'S LAW §103, EXPANDING THE USE OF VIDEOCONFRENCING AT PUBLIC MEETINGS, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part of this resolution.

### RESOLUTION#73-2022; EXPANDING THE USE OF VIDEOCONFRENCING AT PUBLIC MEETINGS

The following Resolution was offered by Councilman Davenport and seconded by Councilman Hunt **WHEREAS** on April 9, 2022, Governor Hochul signed Legislation into law which amended New York State's Public Officers Law ("Public Officers Law") to expand the permitted use of video conferencing at public meetings. (See Chapter 56 of the Laws of 2022 and Public Officer's Law §103, as amended.), and **WHEREAS**, in accordance with Public Officers Law §103, as amended, the Town of Marbletown deems it necessary and appropriate to amend the Videoconferencing Policy as they relate to the use of Videoconferencing at meetings to comply with the recent amendments to the Public Officers Law; now, therefore be it **Videoconference**. Regular and special meetings may be attended via videoconference, when the following process and criteria are met and implemented:

1. Any Board, Committee or Commission member requesting to attend a meeting via videoconference pursuant to Section 103(c) of the Public Officers Law may file a written request with the Town Supervisor no less than 72

hours prior to start of the meeting and that he or she will not be able to personally attend the meeting in a Town of Marbletown facility.

- 2. The Supervisor shall make arrangements for the videoconferencing. Meeting must be held in room or building that is set up to videoconference.
- 3. The video conference shall be conducted in a manner compliant with State Law and shall ensure that all members can see and hear any member videoconferencing in the meeting and that such videoconferencing member(s) can see and hear the other members of the Board, Committee or Commission.
- 4. Any Member attending via videoconference shall ensure that public accessibility is permitted at the location of such member pursuant to Section 104 of the Public Officers Law.
- 5. Attendance via videoconference shall be limited to six (6) instances per calendar year for Town Board members and three (3) for all other boards, committees, and commissions.
- 6. Remote member(s) location at least 72 hours prior to meeting on the town website and social media.
- 7. A Quorum of any board, committee or commission must physically be at advertised location of meeting.
- 8. Costs, if any, associated with the securing or equipment at the remote location, the renting of the remote location, any connection or communication fee charged by the remote location shall be borne by that Member who is attending remotely, and shall not be the responsibility of the Town of Marbletown.
- 9. All Town Board, Planning Board, and Zoning Board meetings must be broadcast live and then archived on Town's website and social media accounts.
- 10. Conditions for extraordinary circumstance videoconferencing: Notwithstanding any other provision of these Rules, members shall be physically present at meetings, unless allowed remote attendance at locations that do not allow for in-person physical attendance by the public, under extraordinary circumstances.
- (i). The list of extraordinary circumstances is non-exhaustive, but shall include disability, illness, caregiving responsibilities or any other significant or unexpected factor or event which precludes the member's physical attendance at such meeting.
- (ii). Members shall provide notice of their inability to attend a meeting to the Town Supervisor at least 48 hours prior to the meeting, or as soon as practicable.
- (iii). The determination of whether circumstances are "extraordinary" as set forth in this Section shall be made by the Town Supervisor.

# RESOLUTION#74-2022, SETTING THE PUBLIC HEARING DATE FOR THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO LOCAL LAW NUMBER 5 OF 2021, A LOCAL LAW KNOWN AS STRETCH ENERGY CODE

The following Resolution was offered by Councilwoman Foote and seconded by Councilman Davenport **WHEREAS**, the Town Board found it to be in the best interests of the residents of the Town of Marbletown to amend Local Law #5 of 2021, as it has been determined by NYS DOS and NYSERTA that the NYSTRETCH Energy Code required modification to be made to the Local Law as language that was provided, creating exemptions for certain sections of the NYS Energy Code and Building Code.

**WHEREAS**, Local Law #5 of 2021 was adopted following Local Law #4 of 2021 when it was determined by NYS DOS that the NYSTRETCH Energy Code needed modification.

#### **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** as follows:

- 1. A public hearing shall be held at the Town Hall at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday August 2, 2022, by interested persons, upon passage of this resolution, to hear all interested parties on the proposed amendment of Local Law #\_\_, 2022 Stretch Energy Code.
- 2. The Town Clerk is directed to advertise such public hearing in the official newspaper of said Town, on the website of said Town and is directed to refer the proposed local law to all municipalities adjacent to the Town and any other applicable entities as required. This shall amend Local Law #5, 2021, Stretch Energy Code that will go into effect upon filing with the Secretary of State.

**NOW THEREFORE,** the Town of Marbletown Town Board authorizes the Highway Superintendent, Town Clerk and Supervisor to sign the attached agreement.

## RESOLUTION #77-2022; REQUESTING A SPEED STUDY ON MOHONK ROAD AND COUNTY ROUTE 6

The following Resolution was offered by Councilwoman Foote and seconded by Councilman Davenport **WHEREAS**, the Town of Marbletown has received complaints about the speed limit on Mohonk Road and County Route 6, and

WHEREAS, Mohonk Road and County Route 6 is frequented by bicyclists and runners, and WHEREAS, the Town of Marbletown recommends that the Ulster County Department of Public Works conduct a speed study on Mohonk Road from County Route 6 to the Gate House at Mohonk Mountain House, and WHEREAS, the Town of Marbletown would also like the Ulster County Department of Public Works to conduct a speed study on County Route 6 from Clove Road to Mohonk Road

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, the Marbletown Town Board requests the Ulster County department of Public Works have the New York State Department of Transportation conduct such study on Mohonk Road and County Route 6, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED,** a copy of this resolution as well as form TE 9a, shall be sent to the New York State Department of Transportation and to the Commissioner of Ulster County Public Works.

### RESOLUTION #78-2022; REQUESTING A SPEED STUDY ON STATE ROUTE 209

The following Resolution was offered by Councilman Hunt and seconded by Councilwoman Foote **WHEREAS**, the Town Board does not have the authority to designate a speed zone for this area; and

WHEREAS, State Route 209 is a New York State highway, and has multiple public ingresses and egresses that access multiple houses and businesses along its entire length, and

WHEREAS, said section of road has multiple individual driveways on both sides, and

WHEREAS, said road is a two-lane highway with no divider separating opposing lanes, and

**WHEREAS**, the current speed limit of 55 mph on a large section of said road is too high and poses a traffic safety hazard and has resulted in multiple fatal accidents in the past five years, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board believes the passing zone just south of Schoonmaker Lane should be removed, and

**WHEREAS**, the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown agrees that the speed limit is too high and should be lowered to 45 mph, now

**THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**; the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown hereby requests that the New York State Department of Transportation conduct a speed study on State Route 209 in Stone Ridge from Ulster County Route 2, also known as Kripplebush Road to the stoplight at State Route 213 East.

- Supervisor Parete explained that the Town is requesting this study due to over the past 4 years there have been four fatalities on Rt. 209.
- Councilman Hunt expressed that when trucks hit their brakes, on Rt. 209, it is very loud. Supervisor Parete stated he would ask about getting "No Engine Braking" signs for Rt. 209.

### **OTHER TOWN BUSINESS:**

- Supervisor Parete stated that the latest storm brought devastation to the Lapla Road area and sections of the woods are gone. The highway department worked non-stop to get assist in getting the roads cleared. Ulster County sent equipment and the Town of Rochester sent staff and equipment to assist in getting trees off of houses.
- Supervisor Parete reported that everyone that had signed up to get their electric from the CCA program have now all been turned back over to Central Hudson. The Town has joined the lawsuit and any updates will be reported.
- Supervisor Parete announced that the 2021 county sales tax went up and this year we could get approximately \$83,000 extra.
- Councilman Hunt reported that the community center needs a new roof and repairs are needed down at the park. A long-term plan would be beneficial for the community center and park.
- At 7:12pm the connection to Zoom was lost and Councilman LaFera left the meeting.
- Supervisor Parete reminded everyone that the grand opening of the Pickleball court will be Friday at 10:00am with refreshments.
- Supervisor Parete declared the primary is coming up in August and the board of elections are in desperate need of election inspectors. If you know anyone please suggest they contact the Board of Elections.

<u>Motion to adjourn:</u> There being no further discussion Councilman Hunt made the motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Councilwoman Foote; 4-0 Aye; 1 absent motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 7:20pm.
