CALL TO ORDER

Supervisor Parete called the meeting to order at 6:02pm and Councilman LaFera lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments on the resolutions presented at the meeting.

PUBLIC HEARING ON ESTABLISHMENT OF A FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT WITH BOUNDARIES TO INCLUDE ALL OF THOSE PROPERTIES CONTAINED WITHIN THE VLY-ATWOOD FIRE DISTRICT

- At 6:05pm a motion was made by Councilwoman Foote, seconded by Councilman LaFera to open the public hearing on the Establishment of a Fire Protection District with the Boundaries to Include all of Those Properties Contained Within the Vly-Atwood Fire District. 5-0 Aye, motion carried.
- Supervisor Parete stated Town Clerk Moody had legally noticed the public hearing in the Daily Freeman on Friday, August 26th. The legal notice as also posted on the town website and the Town Clerk's Community Board.

RESOLUTION#87-2022: NEGATIVE DECLARATION RE: FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA"), the Town Board must make a determination as to the Environmental Impact of this proposed action; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 6 NYCRR, Part 617.6, the Town Board is the only Agency required to approve the proposed action, and is therefore the Lead Agency; and

WHEREAS, a short Environmental Assessment Form has been prepared, signed by the Supervisor, and accepted by the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has duly considered all of the environmental aspects of the proposed action; and NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, based on a review of the Project, there appear to be no significant adverse environmental impacts; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that based upon the Environmental Assessment Form submitted to and reviewed by the Town Board, that this is an Unlisted Action; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that based upon the Environmental Assessment Form, the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown does hereby **ADOPT** the attached **NEGATIVE DECLARATION** with respect to this matter.

RESOLUTION#88-2022; ESTABLISHING A FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT FOR RESIDENTS OF THE FORMER VLY-ATWOOD FIRE DISTRICT

The following Resolution was offered by Councilman Davenport and seconded by Councilwoman Foote **WHEREAS**, the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown, upon its own motion, wishes to establish a Fire Protection District within the Town for the purpose of providing fire protection to the residents of the Town; and **WHEREAS**, a public hearing to determine whether the establishment of a Fire Protection District is in the best interests of the Town was held on September 6, 2022 at 6PM at the Town Hall of the Town of Marbletown; and **WHEREAS**, the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown adopted a resolution determining that a Fire Protection District is in the best interests of the the town of the Town of Marbletown adopted a resolution determining that a Fire Protection District is in the best interests of the former Vly-Atwood Fire District residents;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown determines that it is in the best interests of the Town to establish a Fire Protection District for the purpose of providing fire protection to the residents of the former Vly-Atwood Fire District, and that the property and owners within the former Vly-Atwood Fire District are benefited and included within the bounds of the Fire Protection District,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Fire Protection District of the former Vly-Atwood Fire District shall take effect immediately.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a description of which properties are to be included in the Fire Protection District shall be annexed hereto and made a part of this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this resolution shall be filed with the Clerk of Ulster County and the Division of Audit & Control of the NYS Comptroller within 10 days of adoption.

RESOLUTION#89-2022; AGREEMENT WITH MARBLETOWN SPORTSMAN'S CLUB

The following Resolution was offered by Councilwoman Foote and seconded by Councilman LaFera: **WHEREAS**, in response to the effects of the Coroavirus/Covid 19 the U.S. Department of Treasury established the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA). Part of the plan was to distribute funds to local government in an effort to managing the response and to aid in the recovery from the impacts, and

WHEREAS, ARPA section 602 (c) (1) (A) allows for the use of these funds for public health initiatives in an effort to assist local governments in providing resources in their communities to lessen the impact of public health crises; and

WHEREAS, local governments are the first line of defense against emergencies and disasters and are primarily responsible for managing the response to and recovery from those events, and

WHEREAS, in the event of an emergency or natural disaster, the Town of Marbletown Town Board would like residents to have a safe environment that provides shelter, and

WHEREAS, community organizations are an essential part of any disaster relief effort, providing critical assistance with food and shelter, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown authorizes the Supervisor to sign the attached agreement with the Marbletown Sportsman's Club which has been attached and made a part hereof, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution shall become effective upon its passage by both the Town Board of the Town of Marbletown and the Marbletown Sportsman's Club.

- Supervisor Parete stated that they would like to put a generator in at the Marbletown Sportsman's Club so they can use it as a warming center. A generator would cost a little over \$8,000.
- Councilman Davenport inquired about how the insurance would work. Supervisor Parete stated the town would notify our insurance company and provide them any necessary documentation needed.
- Supervisor Parete added that the money for this could be taken out of the Covid relief funds as we have not used any of those funds to date.

RESOLUTION #90-2022; HIGH FALLS WATER METERS BID

The following Resolution was offered by Councilman LaFera and seconded by Councilman Davenport: **WHEREAS**, the Town Board has previously authorized the preparation of plans and bid documents for the replacement of water meters in the High Falls Water District; and

WHEREAS, the plans and specifications for this work has have been prepared by Brinnier and Larios, P.C., Professional Engineers, of Kingston, NY; and

WHEREAS, the project is a Type 2 action under SEQRA.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Contract HF-201," Installation of Water Meters for the High Falls Water District", be advertised for public bids and the bid date is to be established at the direction of the Town Supervisors of Rosendale and Marbletown.

- Supervisor Parete explained that back in 2019 this was put out for bids, bids were open, and a company was awarded the job, then Covid hit and the no one was going into people's homes. There are approximately 203-204 meters that need to be installed. We have purchased the meters and now they need to be installed.

OTHER TOWN BUSINESS:

- Councilman Davenport reported that there were lots of trees down on the rail trail. He asked that if anyone is out on the trail and sees a tree down to please contact someone at the town and let them know.
- Supervisor Parete said there was a meeting recently with Councilman Davenport, Rail Trail Chairman Carl Pezzino, Highway Superintendent George Dimler and Youth & Rec Director Jill McLean to discuss adding a maintenance/grounds person to the budget. They would be helping out at the community center and the town park.
- Supervisor Parete stated that work on the 2023 budget had started, and it looks like the biggest impact to the budget will the Rescue Squad. Last year we took \$150,000 out of reserves to soften the blow. He is hoping that Rosendale and Rochester will contribute this year.
- Supervisor Parete reported that the roof is leaking at the Community Center, and they are getting quotes now. He also reported that the utilization of the community center is down.
- Supervisor Parete said that the dissolution of the Vly-Atwood Fire District was moving along and now that the public hearing is over all of the paperwork will be forwarded to the County and the State Comptroller. Mohonk Mountain House has shown interest in buying one of the fire trucks. Councilman Davenport suggested having someone come in and do an appraisal of the equipment to find out the worth of what is at the Vly-Atwood Fire House.
- Councilwoman Foote asked about the status of the water lines. Supervisor Parete stated Dennis Larios is looking into this and it will take a little time. Once there is a tentative plan Supervisor Parete will provide a copy to the Board. Councilman Hunt has asked for a copy of the draft.

<u>Motion to adjourn</u>: There being no further discussion Supervisor Parete made the motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Councilman Hunt; 5 Aye; motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 7:25pm.
